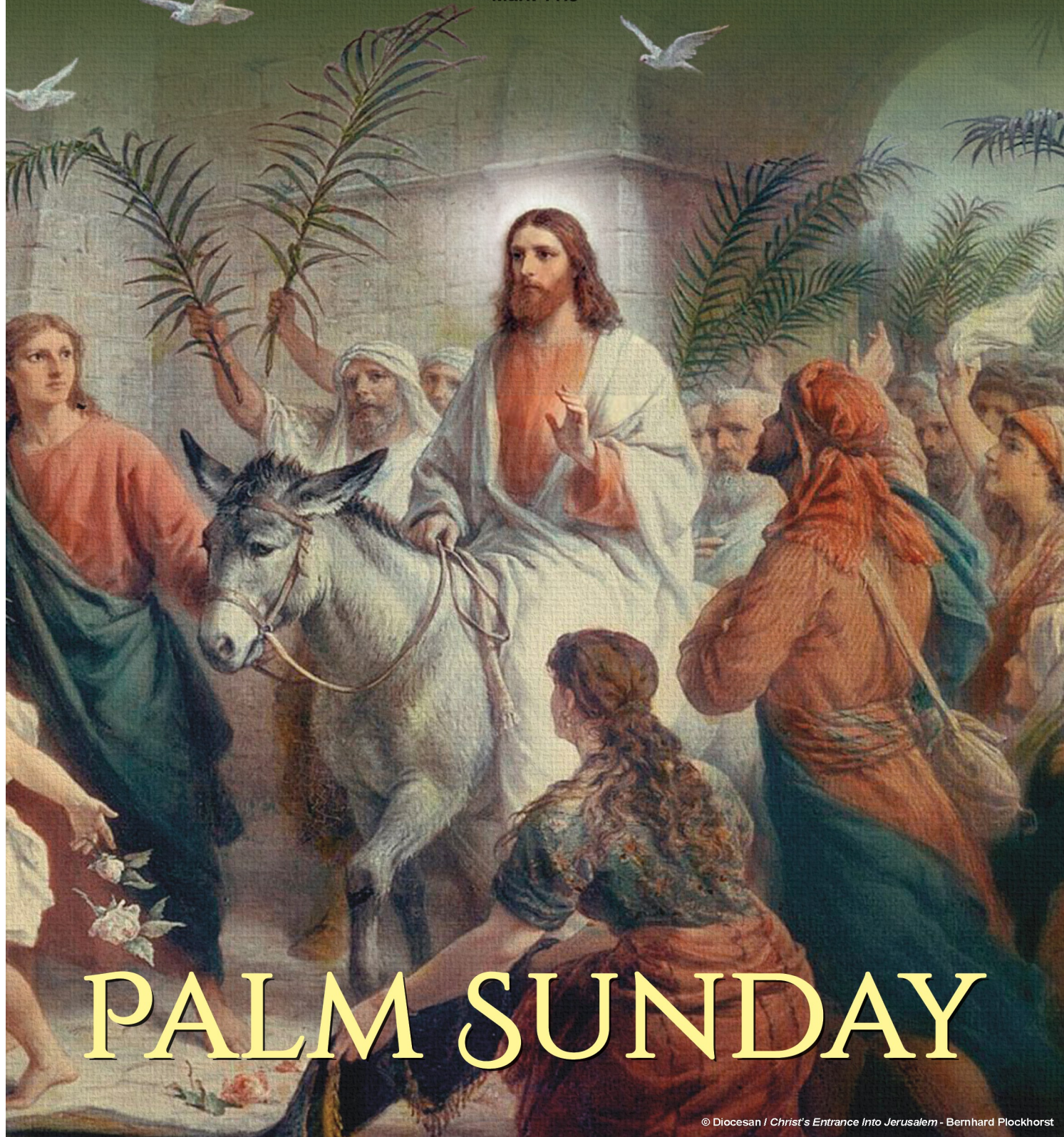

Lessons from the Lord's Passion

'One of the best ways to read the story of Jesus' passion is to put ourselves in His shoes. First, Jesus watched one of His own apostles betray Him with a kiss. Have you ever had someone smile at you on the surface but then do something to intentionally hurt you? If so, you have had a taste of the passion. If you ever had people make up lies and false accusations about you to destroy your reputation, then you have had a taste of the passion. If you have ever been the brunt of terrible jokes that hurt, then you have had a taste of the passion.

Was any of this fun? No. Did it hurt you deeply? Probably. Did you get angry, feel humiliated, harbor resentment? Likely. Did you want to get even? Maybe. At the passion, if Jesus fell prey to one split second of resentment or one moment of anger, He would not have been able to save us. Everything would have been lost. But He didn't. Throughout this ordeal, as unjust as it was, Jesus acted like a lamb led to slaughter. He didn't defend himself. He didn't fight back. Instead, all Jesus did was say, 'Father, forgive them'. (Lk 23:34). As we hear the passion today, let's resolve to be as merciful as we can to everyone who has hurt us, ridiculed us, betrayed us, or tarnished our reputations. Let's also agree never again to undermine someone or hurt someone.' (*Word Among Us*)

Triduum Reflections

'Today we begin Holy Week, the days during which we journey with Jesus on His way of the cross and anticipate his Resurrection on Easter. Today's liturgy begins with the procession with palms to remind us of Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem.

Today the events of Jesus' Passion are proclaimed in their entirety. Those events will be proclaimed again when we celebrate the liturgies of the Triduum: Holy Thursday's Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday Service of the Lord's Passion, and the Easter Vigil.

Jesus acts in obedience to the Father even in death, so that sins may be forgiven. There are many vantage points from which to engage in Jesus' Passion. Sometimes we are like Judas, who betrays Jesus and comes to regret it. We are sometimes like Peter, who denies him, or like the disciples, who fell asleep during Jesus' darkest hour but then act rashly and violently at his arrest. Sometimes we are like Simon, who is pressed into service to help Jesus carry

his cross. Sometimes we are like the leaders who fear Jesus or like Pontius Pilate, who washed his hands of the whole affair. Jesus dies so that our sins will be forgiven. The events of Jesus' Passion, Death, and Resurrection are called the Paschal Mystery. No amount of study will exhaust or explain the depth of love that Jesus showed in offering this sacrifice for us.' (*loyolapass.com*)

Holy Thursday

"We now enter into the "Triduum," the powerful three-day celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus that has been the focus of our Lenten observance. The gospel for this day is taken from John's account of the final Passover, depicting Jesus' vivid sign of tender mercy and compassion as he washes the feet of His disciples. Who can forget the example of Pope Francis, only a few days after he was elected Pope, going to a Roman prison and washing the feet of prisoners. Here is the true face of the Church of Jesus Christ—one of humble service and merciful love. The institution of the Eucharist, the source and summit of our faith, is also commemorated at this Mass.

Good Friday

As a sign of stark grief at the death of Jesus, there is no Eucharist celebrated today. At the Good Friday service, we listen to the Passion Narrative of John's Gospel. John proclaims that the death of Jesus is, paradoxically, the ultimate sign of God's love for the world. As Jesus told his disciples at the final Passover: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." The love and compassion that had driven Jesus as God's Word of love to the world would be expressed in the ultimate act of love—giving one's life for another, and thus Jesus completed the mission given him by His Father. Here is the very heart of the gospel and here is the example every disciple of Jesus is called to follow. It is most fitting, that veneration of the Cross takes place this day, in acknowledgement of this gift.

Holy Saturday

Here on one of the most elaborate liturgical celebrations of the Church year, the stillness of the tomb, and darkness of the Church, gives way to exuberant light of Easter Joy. There is a long parade of beautiful readings taken from the Old Testament. Scripture affirms from its very first pages that the created world is an act of God's love, drawing out of chaos the order and beauty of creation. The summit of God's creative love comes with

the creation of the human being, male and female—a creature shaped in God’s own “image” and “likeness.” Thus the human is amazingly “like God”—able to respond to God, able to love as God’s loves. God declares that this work of creation is “very good”! And that beauty of creation, particularly the creation of the human being, would find its culmination in Jesus Christ, the Word Made Flesh, the ultimate revelation of God’s love.

Lastly, we welcome into the Church through the joy-filled celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation, the members of our OCIA (*Order of Christian Initiation of Adults*). The Elect (those to be Baptized-Confirmed-Eucharist) and the Candidates (those to be received through profession of faith-Eucharist and Confirmation), become full members of the Catholic faith, after many months of prayer and instruction.”

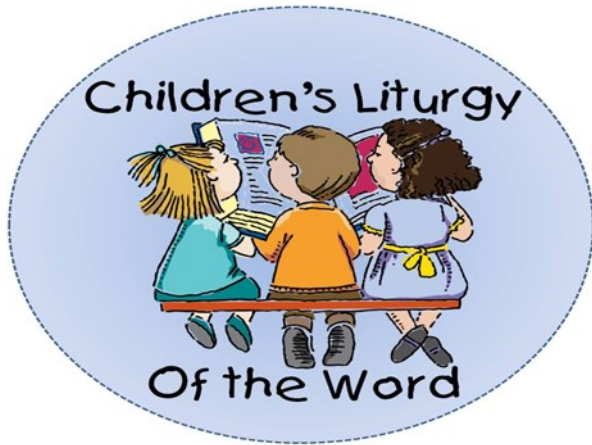

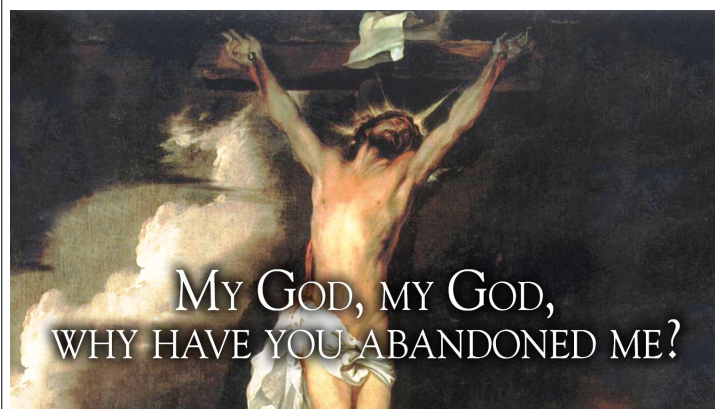

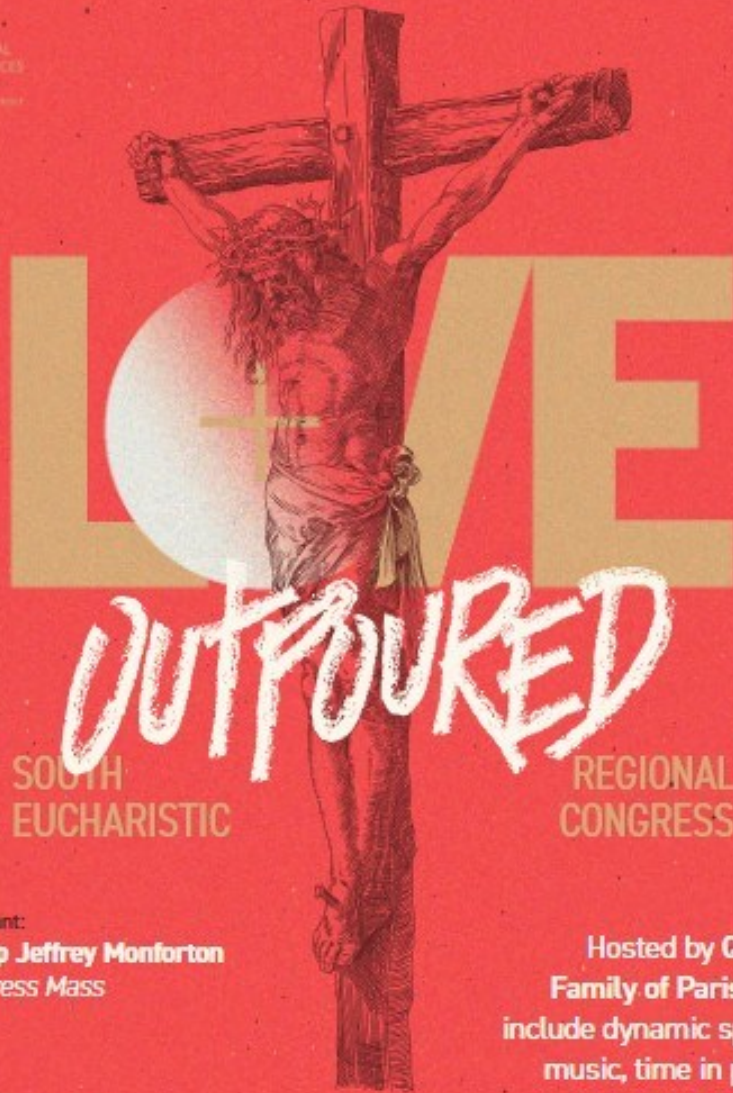
