Fr. John's Journal



My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I hope you are all well and enjoying your summer so far. I hope you had a good Fourth of July. We've had a lot of heat lately, and we've had some pretty big storms. There was no electricity at St. Alfred for Masses this past Sunday. I was very

impressed with the way that the parish carried on with Mass as usual. The choir did great without electricity. Nobody complained about no air conditioning or sound system. The parishioners were grateful to be at Mass. I felt bad that the first Sunday Mass that Fr. Clint McDonnell, our weekend priest helper, experienced in our family of parishes was without electricity. Hopefully the lights and the air conditioning will be on this Sunday!

Taking Up Our Cross

A couple of weeks ago, I read a very interesting reflection by Sister Ruth Burrows, OCD. She was a Carmelite sister in England who was a well-known spiritual writer during her life. Sister Burrows wrote:

"The most valuable form of asceticism, because it is the actual exercise of love, is the patient acceptance of hardships and sufferings of life. For every good, responsible person there is a large measure of suffering which he takes in his stride, hardly adverting to it – it is a part of life. Nevertheless it is just this hidden cross, patiently shouldered day after day that gradually wears down our selfishness. It is the more precious in that it is hidden even from ourselves and does not flatter our pride. Monotony is one such cross. Everyone from childhood upwards has to learn to take monotony if they would get anywhere. It seems an inescapable part of human existence, inescapable that is if we are true to our human condition. There must come a time for each responsible person when options are closed, a way of life is chosen and perseverance in that way of life will be the actual expression of our dedication to God."

I appreciate this reflection because I see so many of our parishioners living this day in and day out in beautiful ways. I see other parishioners having the opportunity to live this out. The cross is a part of the life of every person. We, as Catholics, know that we are baptized into Jesus Christ and into His passion, death and resurrection. We experience moments of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection throughout our lives as we await our inevitable death in this world and our participation, through His grace, in the Resurrection in heaven. At times, however, we can unconsciously believe that there really should not be suffering in our lives. Life should be different than this. We're good people. Why do we have our illnesses, our aches and our pains? Why despite our best efforts and a lot of prayers are

situations in our families somewhere between disappointing and an out and out mess? Why is our employment such a trying experience at times? Why does life seem monotonous at times? Shouldn't our lives be better than this?

As Sister Burrows indicated, there are opportunities embedded in our day-to-day lives for us to shoulder these crosses and to be changed for the better by them. Anytime and any ways in which we are becoming less self-centered, that's a win. The challenge is for us to take up our crosses with the right attitude. Certainly, we can endure our crosses with a spirit of frustration or bitterness. That's a natural response, but that's not helping us become more the ones that Jesus is calling us to be. If we can take up our crosses with a prayerful, open spirit and with the intention to try to unite our cross with the cross of Jesus, yes, we can grow through those experiences. We know that the Eucharist is the most direct way for us to grow in our relationship with Jesus because we are receiving Him, truly present in the Eucharist. We know that our Blessed Mother's mission is to help her children to grow closer to Jesus. Our crosses and our sufferings also offer us many opportunities to be united more closely with Jesus, who understands very well what it is to suffer. They also offer us the opportunity to suffer for particular people in our lives or for particular intentions. We can't let those opportunities slip by without our taking advantage of them. They are opportunities for us to be prepared more and more for eternal life.

The next time we find ourselves sighing in response to something in our lives that we would not choose but that we cannot change, let's try to breathe deeply and focus on Jesus. Remember that Jesus loves us and is with us always in the midst of everything, especially our sufferings. Let us ask Him for the help that we need to carry our crosses as well as possible, to be purified by our crosses and to be drawn even closer to Jesus through our crosses. If we do this again and again in those trying moments, how could those moments of suffering not be sanctified by Jesus? Little by little with Jesus' help we will get there.

Mis hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

Espero que todos estén bien y disfrutando del verano hasta ahora. Espero que hayan pasado un buen 4 de julio. Últimamente ha hecho mucho calor y hemos tenido tormentas bastante fuertes. El domingo pasado no hubo electricidad en San Alfredo durante las misas. Me impresionó mucho la forma en que la parroquia siguió adelante con la misa como de costumbre. El coro hizo un gran trabajo a pesar de la falta de electricidad. Nadie se quejó por la falta de aire acondicionado o de sistema de sonido; los feligreses estaban agradecidos de poder asistir a misa. Me sentí mal que la primera misa dominical que vivió el Padre Clint McDonnell, nuestro sacerdote colaborador de los fines de semana, en nuestra familia de parroquias fuera sin electricidad. ¡Esperemos que este domingo sí haya luz y aire acondicionado!

Tomar nuestra cruz

Hace un par de semanas, leí una reflexión muy interesante de sor Ruth Burrows, OCD. Fue una religiosa carmelita de Inglaterra y una reconocida escritora espiritual en vida. Sor Burrows escribió:

La forma más valiosa de ascetismo, por ser el ejercicio mismo del amor, es la aceptación paciente de las adversidades y los sufrimientos de la vida. Toda persona buena y responsable afronta una gran dosis de sufrimiento que asume con naturalidad, casi sin percibirlo, pues forma parte de la vida. Sin embargo, es precisamente esta cruz oculta, llevada pacientemente día tras día, la que va desgastando nuestro egoísmo. Resulta aún más valiosa por permanecer oculta incluso a nuestros propios ojos, sin halagar nuestro orgullo. La monotonía es una de esas cruces. Desde la infancia, todos debemos aprender a sobrellevar la monotonía si queremos llegar a alguna parte. Parece una parte ineludible de la existencia humana; ineludible, claro está, si somos fieles a nuestra condición humana. Para toda persona responsable llega un momento en que se cierran las opciones, se elige un modo de vida y la perseverancia en ese camino se convierte en la expresión misma de nuestra entrega a Dios.

Aprecio esta reflexión porque veo a muchos de nuestros feligreses vivir esto día tras día de maneras hermosas. Veo a otros feligreses que tienen la oportunidad de vivirlo. La cruz forma parte de la vida de toda persona. Nosotros, como católicos, sabemos que hemos sido bautizados en Jesucristo y en su pasión, muerte y resurrección. Experimentamos momentos de la pasión, muerte y resurrección de Jesús a lo largo de nuestra vida, mientras aguardamos nuestra inevitable muerte en este mundo y nuestra participación, por su gracia, en la Resurrección en el cielo. A veces, sin embargo, podemos creer inconscientemente que en realidad no debería haber sufrimiento en nuestras vidas. La vida

debería ser distinta. Somos buenas personas. ¿Por qué tenemos enfermedades, achaques y dolores? ¿Por qué, a pesar de nuestros mejores esfuerzos y de muchas oraciones, las situaciones en nuestras familias oscilan entre lo decepcionante y el caos absoluto? ¿Por qué nuestro trabajo resulta a veces una experiencia tan ardua? ¿Por qué la vida parece monótona en ocasiones? ¿No deberían ser mejores nuestras vidas?

Como señaló la hermana Burrows, en nuestra vida cotidiana existen oportunidades para cargar con estas cruces y permitir que ellas nos transformen para mejor. Siempre que logramos dejar de centrarnos tanto en nosotros mismos, de cualquier manera que esto ocurra, es un triunfo. El desafío consiste en asumir nuestras cruces con la actitud correcta. Ciertamente, podemos sobrellevarlas con un espíritu de frustración o amargura. Es una reacción natural, pero no nos ayuda a convertirnos en las personas que Jesús nos llama a ser. Si somos capaces de cargar nuestras cruces con un espíritu abierto y de oración, y con la intención de unir nuestra cruz a la de Jesús, entonces sí podremos crecer a través de esas experiencias. Sabemos que la Eucaristía es el medio más directo para crecer en nuestra relación con Jesús, ya que lo recibimos a Él, verdaderamente presente en ella. Sabemos que la misión de nuestra Santísima Madre es ayudar a sus hijos a acercarse más a Jesús. Nuestras cruces y sufrimientos también nos brindan muchas oportunidades para unirnos más estrechamente a Jesús, quien comprende muy bien lo que significa sufrir. Asimismo, nos ofrecen la oportunidad de ofrecer nuestro sufrimiento por personas concretas de nuestra vida o por intenciones específicas. No podemos dejar pasar estas oportunidades sin aprovecharlas; son ocasiones para prepararnos cada vez más para la vida eterna.

La próxima vez que nos sorprendamos suspirando ante algo en nuestra vida que no elegiríamos pero que tampoco podemos cambiar, intentemos respirar profundamente y centrar nuestra atención en Jesús. Recordemos que Jesús nos ama y está siempre con nosotros en medio de todo, especialmente en nuestros sufrimientos. Pidámosle la ayuda necesaria para llevar nuestras cruces de la mejor manera posible, para ser purificados por ellas y para acercarnos aún más a Jesús a través de ellas. Si hacemos esto una y otra vez en esos momentos difíciles, ¿cómo no habrían de ser santificados por Jesús tales momentos de sufrimiento? Poco a poco, con la ayuda de Jesús, lo lograremos.

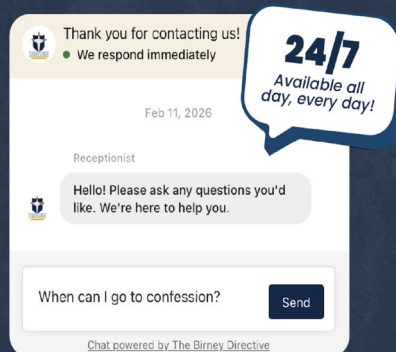

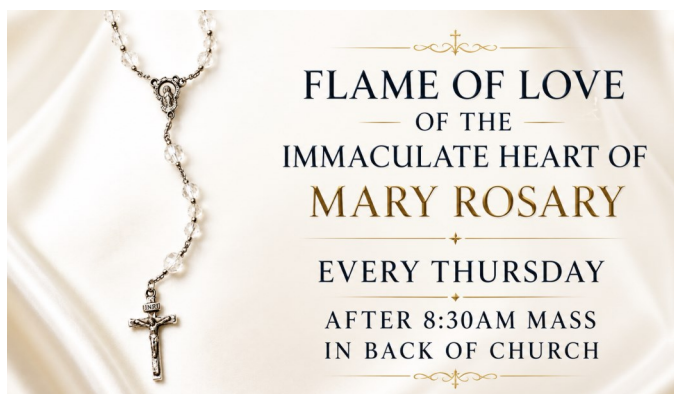

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Parables, Anyone?

When Jesus answers the apostles' question about why he speaks in parables, it may seem as if he is using them to confuse people. We know he is trying to spread the good news of God's kingdom.

So he talks to the crowds in parables, easily understood stories that usually have a moral or that end with a question for the hearers. He uses these stories to teach the crowd.

Jesus threw out parables like a farmer sowing seeds. Some of them fell on the ears of those who would be disciples. But most fell on the ears of people not ready to understand.

So how do we receive his word? Do we hear it without understanding, letting it go in one ear and out the other? Do we hear it joyfully, but then forget it when troubles or difficulties come along? Do we listen to the word but ignore it in the face of some later temptation?

If we want the word to grow strong in us, we can take steps to help ourselves understand it. We can come to church early and spend a few minutes with the readings before Mass.

After Mass we can talk about the readings or the homily with our family over breakfast. We can pick out one practical point to practice that week.

Keeping the word in difficult times is not easy. The cross teaches us to expect troubles, but we have to endure them to really learn that we can go through suffering to a new life.

To be strong enough to resist temptations, we have to decide each day that we want to follow Jesus' word. We can pray for that strength and ask God to help us remember that word when temptations come. And we can decide to stay away from the places, people, or situations that so tempt us.

God's word can be likened to a ball game. We can sit back and watch, not really involved or caring who wins. Or we can jump in and participate and make the game ours.

Let us ask God how we can take the word and run with it.

Did You Know?

Renovations took place in church in 1976. Several rows of pews were removed near the main entrance and the Tabernacle was moved from the platform behind the altar to the Outer Drive side pulpit. The roofs on the school and church were replaced. Our individual private confessionals in church were sealed as the new Rite of Penance required a larger and more comfortable setting. The Ushers Room near the cry room, was refurbished to meet the need.

Due to the harsh 1976-77 winter and some vandalism, the wall in front of the parish hall needed replacing but the cost was prohibitive. After much discussion members of the Dads Club, to save the parish money, removed the wall, leveled the ground, planted shrubs and laid sod. The winter also caused fuel bills to soar so a special "Fuel Collection" was held. Financially, it was a rough year as Fr. Witkowski announced the need to raise up to \$60,000 for repairs to parish properties.

The Dominican Sisters have served 51 years in our parish and their Grand Rapids Community was celebrating its 100th birthday. The First Sunday of May, 1977 was dedicated to the sisters with a special Mass followed by a reception in the parish hall.

On November 20, 1977 the optional practice of receiving Holy Communion in the hand was introduced.

Fr. Buhl celebrated the 50th anniversary of his ordination with a special sung Latin Mass and a dinner-dance.

A parish survey showed a real interest in our school having a Kindergarten program. A morning, afternoon and full-day program were developed and ready to begin in the fall of 1978.

On January 21, 1979 we helped Fr. Raymond Kalisz, S.V.D. celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination. He was the first priest to be ordained from St. Mary Magdalen parish.

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha (1656-1680)

Feast Day: July 14

Though the New York State Thruway runs close by the North American Martyrs' Shrine, traffic's roar never pierces the peace enveloping Auriesville—Ossernon to Native Americans—in the lovely Mohawk Valley, where Kateri Tekakwitha was born barely ten years after the martyrdom of Isaac Jogues and his Jesuit and lay companions. Daughter of a Christian Algonquin mother and non-Christian Mohawk chief, Kateri's parents died in a smallpox epidemic widely blamed on the missionaries. Moreover, many Native Americans had experienced exploitation at the hands of "Christian" traders and trappers, further discrediting the faith Kateri embraced in baptism, then pledged to live even more intensely in vowed virginity.

Misunderstanding led to harassment, prompting her move to a Christian village farther north along the Saint Lawrence River. Despite this, Kateri's faith remained undaunted, her selfless charity undiminished. Both before and after her death at twenty-four, this young "Lily of the Mohawks" drew countless converts to Christ by the fragrance of her goodness. Through us, does "the aroma of Christ" (2 Corinthians 2:15), attract others to the beauty of his gospel?

Summer UV Protection: Key Facts you should know

Ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun can damage your skin and eyes, increasing the risk of sunburn, premature skin aging, cataracts, and skin cancer. UV protection is important all year—not just on hot, sunny days. UV rays can penetrate clouds and reflect off water, sand, concrete, and snow.

Top UV Protection Tips

1. Use sunscreen every day
 - Choose a broad-spectrum sunscreen (protects against both UVA and UVB rays).
 - Use SPF 30 or higher for best everyday protection.
 - Apply sunscreen 15 minutes before going outside and reapply every 2 hours, or more often if swimming or sweating.
2. Seek shade during peak sun hours
 - UV rays are strongest between 10am and 4pm in most areas.
 - Check the daily UV Index. When it's 3 or higher, take protective measures.
3. Wear protective clothing
 - Long-sleeved shirts, long pants, and tightly woven fabrics provide additional UV protection.
 - Consider clothing labeled with a UPF (Ultraviolet Protection Factor) rating.
4. Don't forget your hat and sunglasses
 - Wear a wide-brimmed hat to protect your face, ears, and neck.
 - Choose sunglasses that block 100% of UVA and UVB rays.
5. Avoid tanning beds
 - Artificial tanning devices expose users to UV radiation that can increase skin cancer risk. A tan is actually a sign of skin damage.

Common Myths

"I'm safe if it's cloudy."

Up to much of the sun's UV radiation can still reach your skin on cloudy days.

"People with darker skin don't need sunscreen."

Everyone can experience UV damage and develop skin cancer, regardless of skin tone.

"A base tan protects me."
